



5 ways to balance flexibility with structure in course design

- 1. Keep deadlines, but build in flexibility.
- 2. Make course materials accessible w/ guidance on how to best engage w/ materials.
- 3. Explain & reflect on the advantages of coming to class.
- 4. Encourage attendance, but allow for absences.
- 5. Give time to build community.

Example: "Flexibility with Accountability" in Intro Biology @ Temple

- 1. Keep deadlines, but build in flexibility.
- 2. Make course materials accessible w/ guidance on how to best engage w/ materials.
- 3. Explain & reflect on the advantages of coming to class.
- 4. Encourage attendance, but allow for absences.
- 5. Give time to build community.

- Explicit guidelines for extensions
- Student choice in assignments (in limited cases)
- Recorded lectures; guided notes
- Digital lab materials w/ writable access; instructions on collabs

- "Revenge quizzes" held in class
- Letter-writing campaign to future students
- Make-up labs through Google sign-up; exams can be made up (w/ limitations)
- Groups are assigned asset mapping
- Acknowledgments & consensus
