KANT'S CRITIQUE OF PURE REASON

Kant's *Critique of Pure Reason* is one of the most important texts in modern philosophy. In this course, we will be exploring both its epistemological and metaphysical doctrines. We will be discussing what, according to Kant, are the limits of our finite human understanding, how mind can be constitutive of experience, the role of time and space as pure a priori intuitions that constitute experience. We will further be discussing Kant's doctrine of transcendental idealism and how it compares to other types of idealism in contemporary epistemology. We will also be discussing the relevance of Kant's doctrine of transcendental idealism for his practical philosophy and for his metaphysical doctrine of freedom of the will, the existence of God, and the immortality of the soul.
