

Join this interdisciplinary and intergenerational class and learn to:


- make and defend ethical arguments

Decentering Whiteness: Implications for Healthcare & Higher Education

Students in this course will:

- develop an understanding of the social construction of race
- gain an understanding of the influences of whiteness and White dominant culture on one's worldview, interpersonal relationships, higher education administration, and healthcare delivery
- identify practical strategies to mitigate the impact of implicit bias, anti-Black racism and other forms of racism in healthcare and higher ed settings

This course is open to students who have earned at least a Bachelor's degree and is a worthwhile option for healthcare providers at any level, instructors, advisors, counselors, and other higher ed administrators.
