The Coalition of Occupational Therapy Advocates for Diversity (COTAD) is a non-profit national organization and network of OT practitioners and OT/OTA students. COTAD's mission is to empower occupational therapy leaders to work toward advancing and transforming the occupational therapy profession into one that is established on practices that increase justice, equity, diversity, and inclusion for all populations and communities served. COTAD believes that necessary advancement in occupational therapy can be achieved by engaging in practices that promote anti-racism and antioppression within the community and classroom. Temple's COTAD chapter walks in stride with the mission presented by the national organization. We have held several events including diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) training within the cohort, guest speakers to expand learning, and incorporated OT spotlights celebrating the contributions and influence of OT therapists with diverse backgrounds. We have also worked on events including fundraisers and drives that give directly back to the Philadelphia community. This year, the Temple COTAD chapter held several fundraisers and drives. We held a Chipotle fundraiser with all funds raised begin donated to The Trevor Project, a national organization providing crisis support services to LGBTQ+ youth. We also held a pride pin fundraiser to benefit the Mazonni Center, an organization providing health and wellness services to our local LGBTQ+ community. In collaboration with Why Not Prosper, a local non-profit organization providing programs and services supporting incarcerated women as the return to the community, we collected hygiene supplies and writing materials for incarcerated women. Faulty Spotlight: Lina Maria Garcia

I always knew I wanted to help people, be creative, and support people's success and feelings of belongingness. I majored in Psychology at LaSalle University and worked as a Mental Health Technician at an inpatient mental health facility where I was more formally introduced to Occupational Therapy. I went on to earn my Master of Occupational Therapy in 2012 with a research focus on salsa steps for social development. I spent the next 10 years in direct clinical practice. I primarily worked with adults in Home Health settings and Skilled Nursing Facilities (SNF) with orthopedic and neurological conditions, and underlying psychiatric and substance abuse diagnoses. I also spent almost 3 years in travel therapy where I practiced in Philadelphia, Boston, Los Angeles, and Cincinnati. During my time in Cincinnati, I also began serving as a mentor, then site leader, and program consultant for a wonderful non-profit organization, Ladies of Leadership, who serves girls ages 7-18 from underserved communities. Here, I applied the OT lens to groups, curriculum building, program support, and development. I earned my OTD in 2018, from Temple University's post-professional OT doctoral program, with a research focus on community integration at the SNF level. I continued my relationship with TUOT as a level I FW preceptor, and a level II FW Supervisor with Special Olympics, before formally becoming an adjunct clinical instructor in 2020. I recently relocated to Philadelphia from Cincinnati, to begin my new role as a full-time Assistant Professor at TUOT. I have a passion for community practice, culturally humble patient care, and working to minimize health disparities, especially in historically marginalized communities.

Dr. Beth Pfeiffer was named to the Temple University Gallery of Success. Part of her nomination included her more than 20 million dollars in funding, her numerous awards, and her contribution to the lives of autistic individuals and individuals with developmental disabilities as well as those of the OT students whom have had the honor to work with her. This award comes from "The Board of Trustees of the American Occupational Therapy Foundation (AOTF) seeks to recognize the outstanding service of those contributing their time, energies, and support to the fulfillment of the Foundation's mission, goals, and objectives."



Faculty Award: Cynthia Abbott-Gaffney

Dr. Cynthia Abbott-Gaffney will receive the high honor of Fellow of the American Occupational Therapy Association on March 23, 2024. Being selected as a member of the Roster of Fellows is an honor given to a therapist who has demonstrated a significant contribution to the field of occupational therapy. Prior to the pandemic, Dr. Abbott-Gaffney developed an online, asynchronous training program for OT practitioners promoting best-practices in use of telehealth technologies as a part of her doctoral dissertation at Boston University. When the pandemic occurred, Dr. Abbott-Gaffney and her Mentor, Dr. Karen Jacobs, OT, EdD, OTR, CPE, FAOTA conducted free webinars to assist therapists around to globe in quickly pivoting to successful telehealth use, presenting over 50 times in 78 different countries. She has since, through community service, partnered with the Head Injury Foundation of India for ongoing collaboration for assistive technology and telehealth bestpractice training to get needed health services to underserved individuals. Dr. Abbott-Gaffney also co-authored the 2021 World Federation of Occupational Therapists revised Position Statement.

3D Printing Initiative

Dr. Kimberly Pachik and Dr. Erica Pugh, in collaboration with their Athletic Training (AT) colleagues, Dr. Jamie Mansell and Dr. Elizabeth Neil, were awarded a Loretta C. Duckwork Scholars Studio Makerspace grant to support the use of technology in innovative teaching practices. The early-stage pilot project provided an interprofessional learning opportunity for OT and AT students to work together on the design and fabrication of a 3D printed upper extremity orthosis. Both disciplines have accreditation standards related to interprofessional team dynamics, and orthotic design, fabrication and management. With OT's advanced knowledge in this area, it was a natural fit for the students to work together. Additionally, given that both programs reside in the College of Public Health they are committed to finding innovative ways to reduce barriers to accessing care, including cost related burden of care and increasing collaboration in healthcare, as literature suggests it improves patient outcomes. The project had two main objectives for the learners: describe the interprofessional opportunities for ATs and OTs to collaborate on orthotic fabrication and demonstrate the application of innovative orthotic fabrication methods for increased accessibility. The faculty presented the project outcomes at the International Education Collaborative (IPEC) 2023 poster fair, in a presentation titled ""Promoting innovative interprofessional learning through the use of 3D printed orthotics"

Janice Witt OTR/L, Executive Director at Special Equestrians

After graduating and getting my OT license, I moved into early intervention and school-based therapy full time. I've always been involved in equine therapy but due to the emerging nature of the field, jobs were limited. About a year into my career, a full-time management position became available as the Program Director at Special Equestrians Therapeutic Riding and I moved into my dream position in equine therapy. Initially I was worried that as a trained occupational therapist. I wouldn't be prepared for management position in the non-profit world but I quickly realized that Temple's comprehensive curriculum provides students with creative thinking, flexibility and interpersonal skills that allow us to move into such roles with ease. On top of the necessary occupational therapy training, Temple's curriculum prepared me with the leadership and management skills for my initial position of Program Director and my current position as Executive Director of Special Equestrians. Our center has greatly grown with the recent addition of TUOT fieldwork students that assist in our growing hippotherapy program but also provide valuable OT influence in our community-based and individual rider programs. I'm always thankful for my time with Temple OT and our continued, evolving relationship with the students and faculty.

Lindsey Godshalk OTR/L, Mental Health Setting

At Fairmount Behavioral Health System, I provide short-term treatment and stabilization following a mental health crisis. I work with individuals of all backgrounds and cultures from across the lifespan (adolescents to older adults). My patients present with a variety of symptoms and diagnoses, including but not limited to depression, anxiety, schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, PTSD, and personality disorders. As an occupational therapist, I facilitate groups and individual, client-centered interventions with a trauma-informed approach that emphasizes function and authenticity to daily life. Some topics explored in group and individual sessions include self-care, medication management, emotional regulation, diagnosis/symptom education, coping skills, sleep hygiene, ADLs, thought restructuring, and many others. With an OT mindset, I aim to adapt meaningful daily activities to the appropriate physical and cognitive level of my patients. I strive to create a safe and comfortable environment for my patients to heal and move forward in their recovery journeys. With the help of the TUOT students, I am piloting a sensory curriculum on the women's trauma unit to promote sensory education and self-soothing techniques. This curriculum will address the 5 basic senses: taste, touch, smell, sight, and sound. My hope is that this project will encourage patients to explore and develop self-soothing techniques and prevent moments of crisis. I am continuing to expand and define occupational therapy in an inpatient mental health setting through staff education and outreach. I look forward to working with Temple OT to spread awareness and advocate for the impact of occupational therapy within the mental health field.
